

Clifford Sadlier

Ciliford Sadilei
Born in the suburb of Camberwell, Sadlier attended University High School before his family moved to Western Australia while he was still a youth. They settled at Subiaco, Western Australia from where Sadlier, then employed as a commercial traveller, enlisted on 26 May 1915.
Sadlier first embarked on board HT <i>Nestor</i> , posted to the Australian Army Medical Corps and allotted as a reinforcement <i>t</i> o1st Australian General Hospital, with which he served at Heliopolis. In he returned to Australia on nursing duty, and on 9 November he re-embarked, on board <i>HMAT AT Argyllshire</i> then as a reinforcement to 51st Battalion.
The 51st, Australian Imperial Force was raised at Tel-el-Kebir, Egypt, on 1 March 1916 from half of the 11th Battalion(veterans of the Gallipoli landings) and reinforcements of the 11th and 28th Battalions, all personnel being Western Australian volunteers. Sadlier joined the unit in France on 13 May 1917, was promoted to
He was 26 years old, and a lieutenant in the 51st Battalion, Australian Imperial Force during the Firstwhen the following deed took place during the Second Battle of Villers-Bretonneux for which he was awarded the VC.
War Office, 11 th July, 1918.
His Majesty the has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Victoria Cross to the undermentioned Officers and Non-Commissioned Officer: —
On 24/25 April 1918 at, France, Lieutenant Sadlier's platoon had to advance through a wood where a strong enemy machine-gun post was causing casualties and preventing the advance. Although he was himself wounded, Lieutenant Sadlier at once collected his bombing section and led them against the machine-guns, killing the crews and capturing two of the guns. By this time his party were all casualties and alone he attacked a third enemy machine-gun with his revolver, killing the crew and taking the gun. In doing so, he was again wounded. The veryof this officer was the means of clearing the flank, and allowing the battalion to move forward, there by saving a most critical situation. His coolness and utter disregard of danger inspired all.[1]
Sadlier was invalided to Australia on 24 August 1918 and was discharged on 4 March 1919.He returned to Western Australia living at Busselton and for some years was State Secretary of the Returned and Services League of
He married Alice Edith Smart on 17 July 1936. From then until 1949 he was a clerk in the Repatriation Department in Perth. He went to London in 1956 for the Victoria Cross Centenary celebrations.
He died in Busselton on 28 April 1964 and was cremated at Karrakatta Cemetery, Perth WA. His ashes were taken from there by the funeral director. In 1980, his widow donated his medals to St. George's Cathedral, and they are held in a safe there, with replicas on display in the Soldiers' Chapel. Charles Albert Stokes

Charles parents were ,,,,,,,, in St Stephan's Church Ballarat 27th December 1875, George was 18 years occupation listed as a labour with Mary 17 years occupation listed as a dressmaker. The Minister Henry Edward Cooper married them. When Charles was ,,,,,,, his three ,,,,,,, and two ,,,,,,,. Ellen Elizabeth Stokes born 1857, George William Stokes born 1878, Jess Richard Stokes born 1879, James Stokes born 1881, Mary (Minnie) Frances Stokes born 1883. There is mention of a younger sister Rose but there are no details at this time of writing. With Charles father, as "horse dealer" Charles ,,,,, ,,,, around horses and it is believed he was an expert rider, team master and breaker. In the 1890's Charles has accompanied his brothers along with his father to Western Australia by bringing horses by ship.

In 1907 Charles married Ellen Annie Bagley where they had four ,,,,,,,. George, Emily (Edie), Veronica (Ron) who were born prior to Charles heading off to The Great War in 1916. Gwendoline the fourth child was born in 1922. Charles returned from The Great War in April 1919 and was discharged in the June where under the Returned ,,,,,,,,, Settlement Scheme he settled to Kirup in the Upper Capel Valley area.

In 1927 Emily (Edie) ,,,,,,, seriously ill and needed special treatment in Perth where Charles and the family ,,,,,,, the farm to return to Perth purchasing a house in Subiaco. Charles commenced a business as a carrier. During World War 2 there was petrol rationing, so Charles ,,,,,,, his truck and went to work for the Subiaco Council until his retirement. in the November of ,,,,,

He passed away in November 1969 aged 84. His wife passed away in in 1984 aged 97 years.

Letters between John Simpson Kirkpatrick and his Mother, 1914 The Australian Imperial Expeditionary Force (W.A contingent) XMas Day 1914

Dear Mother

Just a line to let you know that I am still in Cairo. It is XMas Day today.

I was look forward to spending today in Shields but I was doomed to be disappointed.

I would not have joined this contingent if I had known that they were not going to England.

I would have taken the trip home and had a holiday at home then joined the army at home and went to the front instead of being stuck in the ungoldy hole for all that you can see is sand and drill from morning to night and the grub is very poor and not half enough of it.

I have lost about a stone in weight since I joined the contingent for when I joined I went 12 stone 7 pounds and I made it over to Sarah Simpson and I am in the name of Jack Simpson here in the Section.

I hear that we are likely to move from here in about six weeks time and whether we will go to England or the Continent I could not tell you.

But I hope that we will go to England for I would give anything to have a run up to Shields to see you and Annie before I went to the front.

I see by the papers that the Germans have killed alot of people in Hartlepool they were pretty close to Shields. I hope that they don't get as near again for I would not like to see poor old Shields knocked about by the Germans. but they will have to fear the pipes for it all in the long run.

I would like to have the pleasure of putting a bullet through the dammed Old Kaiser for he is the start of the lot. But it is just as well for it happen some time. Now Mother I hope that these few lines will find you and Annie well as it leaves me at present.

So iwth love to you and Annie.

I remain your loving Son Jack. P.S. I wrote you a letter last week.

I hope that you got it all right.


